Ledbury Community Day 2019

Ledbury's annual community day gave us an opportunity both as a Tower and a Ringing District to share our enthusiasm with the many people out and about on 8th June.

The portable, working model bell (often called a dumbbell although by computer wizardry it makes a noise!) was installed under the Market House and those 'having a go' included a 3 year old and our new mayor!

In the Burgage Hall we were able to show video clips of the bells working and explain the 'Bell to Remember' project as well as encouraging people to come and try this amazing hobby.



Open evenings

On July 16th we were able to welcome another group of interested local people to the tower. They were offered the chance to climb to the belfry itself to see the bells: an opportunity to find out just how imposingly large they are and to understand better the challenges of ringing them. Afterwards the visitors stayed to watch the ringers raise the bells and ring some rounds, call changes and simple methods.
